#### REGENTS MESSAGE

This year's State Conference was a fun, informative and engaging weekend. I loved hearing about all the wonderful activities Nevada Daughters have been doing this year to support education, patriotism and historic preservation. I also enjoyed meeting several past State Regents as well as getting to know some members of our current State Executive Board.

While attending the 100<sup>th</sup> NSSDAR State Conference in April, I was gifted a book about the history of the Nevada State Society. Even though this year was the 100<sup>th</sup> Conference, the State Society was founded in 1910 in Goldfield, NV by a Colorado Daughter named Blanche Seaman Sprague. The first Nevada chapter was named the Montezuma Chapter and was disbanded in 1919 after the gold rush ended and the population of Goldfield dwindled down to a few hundred people. Four years later the Nevada Sagebrush Chapter in Sparks, NV organized which today is the oldest chapter in Nevada.

An interesting side note, my Great-Great Grandfather (and a member of the Sons of the American Revolution) had moved his family to Goldfield in the early 1900.

#### Constitution Week Committee

"I Am An American" Day was celebrated first in 1940. The day was moved to September 17, and the name was changed to Citizenship Day in 1952. In 1955, President Eisenhower proclaimed the first Constitution Week and the DAR established the week-long, Sept. 17-23, annual celebration in 1956. It commemorates the signing of the US Constitution. It is the oldest constitution still in active use in the world today and is the basic document of our republic, which protects our individual liberties of all citizens through written law. It is up to each of us to read the Constitution, know our rights and what it says and what it doesn't say.

"Hear Ye. Hear Ye" as we celebrate our US Constitution.

Mayor Jesse Whipple proclaimed Constitution Week, 2025, for Mesquite at a city council meeting. 





May 26 – Memorial Day

May 30, 1783 - The Pennsylvania Evening Post became the first daily newspaper published in America.

May 30, 1922 - The Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C., was dedicated.
